

JOUR 295: Media Practicum

COURSE OVERVIEW

This 3-credit practicum (JOUR 295) is a hybrid course that combines classroom instruction with hands-on experience in the School of Journalism and Media Studies. Students will work with faculty and facilities to produce media. This course allows undergraduates the opportunity to gain experience with media without having to have first taken pre-requisite courses.

Students familiarize themselves with the skills and concepts associated with audience analysis and engagement, editing, news values, platforms, producing original content, and social media. Faculty members supervise in areas of student interest within media settings, allowing the development of journalistic applications in the various media

Final Project: Toward the end of the semester, you will also submit a Final Project, which will consist of a Reflection Paper (minimum 5 pages) that describes the skills gained and experiences developed over the course of the semester. The Final Project will also consist of a Portfolio
